The Access Card

This is a new type of discount card for disabled people rolling out across the UK. It is only available to disabled people who meet the definition as laid out in the Equality Act.

Each symbol on the card will help businesses and organisations provide the card holder with the support they need to access their service.

We're looking for as many providers as possible to share offers and discounts with our card holders.

The card also links to our quality assurance system **CredAbility**.



A **CredAbility** approval shows that a business or organisation is a provider of choice for Access Card holders.

DisabledGo

Founded in 2000, **DisabledGo** is committed to providing independence and choice to disabled people, their friends, family and carers.

By providing detailed access information from a pan-disability perspective, **DisabledGo** is able to empower disabled people to confidently be a part of their local community and not apart from it.

There are detailed guides to over 125,000 public venues and services all over the UK.

Every guide featured on **DisabledGo** is visited and assessed in person by a trained DisabledGo surveyor asking questions designed by disabled people, for disabled people.

As part of the *Accessible Sheffield* project, **DisabledGo** will be providing access guides to 1,000 venues across Sheffield. All the information collected will be available online throughout 2015.

DisabledGo recognise that the power of knowing a particular venue is suited to your individual needs before leaving home cannot be underestimated.
